# What We're READing...

### A Review of James Lee Burke's "Dixie City Jam" by Mark Hargrave

So here's the mix: Take a WWII Nazi submarine sunk off the coast of New Orleans; a recovering alcoholic excop and his family; throw in a psychotic holdover from the Third Reich, along with a cast of characters as eccentric as any in modern fiction, and you have the makings of Dixie City Jam, the seventh novel in the Detective Dave Robicheaux series. In this installment, Dave Robicheaux, a retired detective with the New Orleans police department, who now operates a bait shop and boat rental business in rural New Iberia, aims to collect the ten-thousand dollar reward offered for locating, of all things, a Nazi submarine. The sub, lost with all hands in 1943 during a sea battle at the mouth of the Mississippi River, is sought after by one Hippo Bimstine, a local businessman with heavy connections in the local Democratic Party (read corruption).

Ostensibly wanted by Hippo to create a money-making media sensation, the sub represents other, darker motives lurking behind Hippo's desire to capture this artifact. Hippo's reward money becomes a matter of life and death after Battiste, Dave's bait shop tender, is arrested for assaulting a local crack cocaine dealer, and is trapped in a brutal New Orleans jail. Robicheaux is a sensitive, complex and conflicted man, a recovering alcoholic, balancing a precarious mix of guilt-edged ethics, Cajun pride, and a repressed penchant for renegade justice. Along with his wife, Bootsie and daughter Alafair, Dave has carved out a lifestyle back in the Louisiana bayous that provides a measure of peace and normalcy in the otherwise tempestuous world of South Louisiana.

Before long, Dave and his family become mired in a battle with Will Buchalter, a mysterious and savage sadist, who perpetrates a series of harrowing attacks against Bootsie, leaving her tormented and despondent. We gradually learn that Buchalter wants the submarine for entirely different reasons, employing a string of terrorist tactics calculated to force Robicheaux to capitulate to the Dark Side. As Robicheaux and his old detective partner, Cletus Purcel (a man whose lifestyle and police methods are as wildly unorthodox as a football bat) pursue the ghostly Buchalter, the narrative crescendos to a nerve-wracking high voltage showdown.

The author doses up the plot of Dixie City Jam with New Orleans mafiosi, corrupt police officials, hookers and junkies, saturated portraits of a quality recognized as the stock-in trade of James Lee Burke. Burke's prose is uniquely his own. Powerful and compelling, his narrative style is by turns vividly colorful, darkly comic, and brutally confessional.

Both New Orleans and its surrounding Bayou Country are beautifully delineated, serving as quasi-characters in this, one of the finest of James Lee Burkes's Robicheaux series.
